Halal Connection

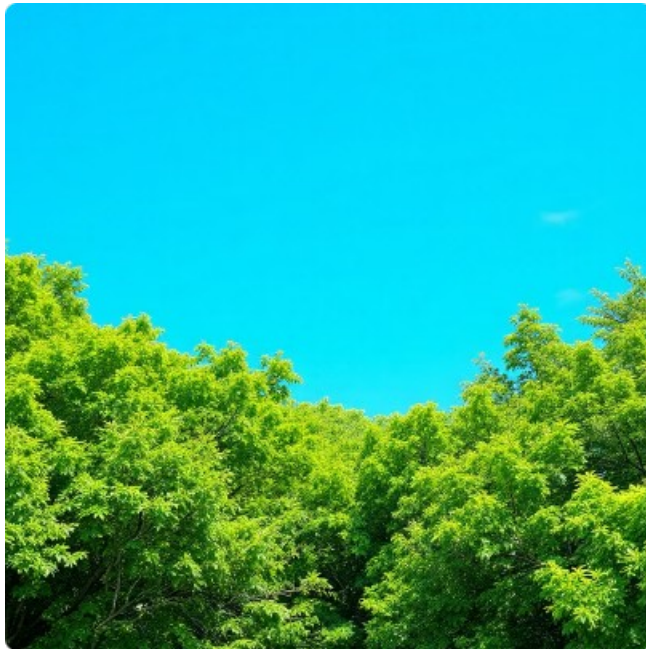
Sustainability in halal indicates that halal principles must be preserved and passed on from generation to generation while adapting to technological and societal progress



Understanding Sustainability

The most effective definition of sustainability belongs to the World Commission on Environment and Development (WCED 1987). According to WCED, "Sustainable development is development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs." Although this definition seems simple, its scope is multifaceted.

An important aspect of sustainability is recognizing that Earth's natural resources are finite. In 2015, world leaders adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and 17 Sustainable Development Goals to reduce poverty and inequality and combat climate change and environmental degradation.



Environmental Dimension

The worsening environmental indicators such as CO₂ concentration, greenhouse gas emissions, temperature changes, and biodiversity loss are concerning.



Social Dimension

Human overuse of flora and fauna, per capita energy use, water scarcity, and deforestation rates affect the social dimension of sustainability.



Economic Dimension

Since the 1992 Rio Summit, governments, multinational corporations, and consumers have shown increasing interest in sustainability.

Animal Welfare in Halal Practices

Halal food systems have the potential to contribute significantly to a more sustainable global paradigm. The most commonly understood connection between the concept of Halal and sustainable practices is the welfare provided by avoiding cruelty, especially when it comes to animals.

Halal certification sets out a strict set of requirements for any farm seeking Halal certification. As with all certifications, this serves as a simple checklist for guidelines that enhance sustainability in hydrocarbon heating, fertilizer-dependent, pesticide-dependent, mono-cropping, soil-depleting, biodiversity-irrigation land practices.



Halal Slaughter Principles

The principle of not causing suffering to animals is based on ethical considerations in addition to legal requirements. Authorities and organizations on animal welfare recognize the general goals of Halal practitioners to reduce animal suffering and suggest that discussions related to Halal slaughter practices be resolved through evidence-based science.



Farm Practices

A Halal-certified farm is not allowed to inject hormones into the fetuses of cows or sheep to fatten their bodies. Stress in confined feeding areas is prohibited. Halal farms are also encouraged to follow the spirit of organic farming.



Chemical Use

Halal farms are deterred from using chemicals, modifying genes, or developing synthetic substitutes for products provided by ecosystems.



Animal Welfare in Halal Practices



Ethical Treatment

Halal certification prohibits cruelty to animals and requires humane treatment throughout their lives, not just during slaughter.



Prohibited Practices

Halal-certified farms cannot inject hormones to fatten animals or keep them in cramped feeding lots that cause stress.



Natural Approach

Halal farms are encouraged to follow organic agriculture principles, avoiding chemicals, genetic alterations, or synthetic substitutes.



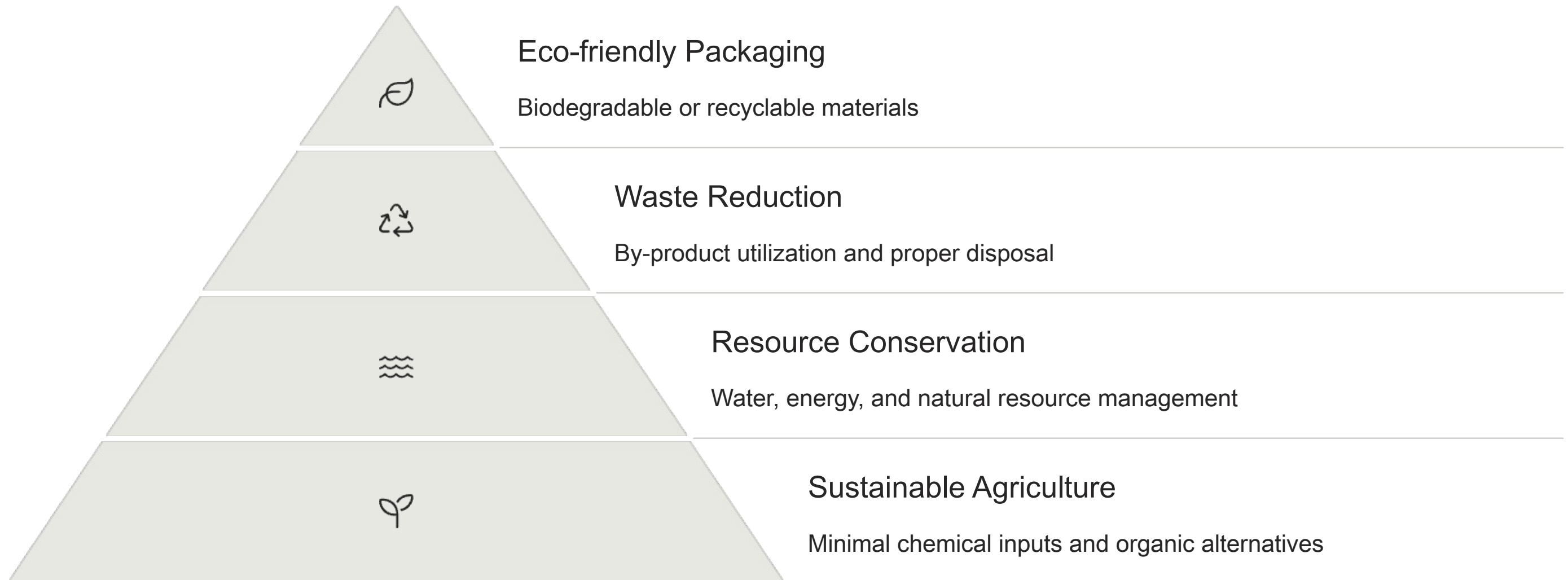
Evidence-Based Methods

Fair Trade & Equal Opportunity

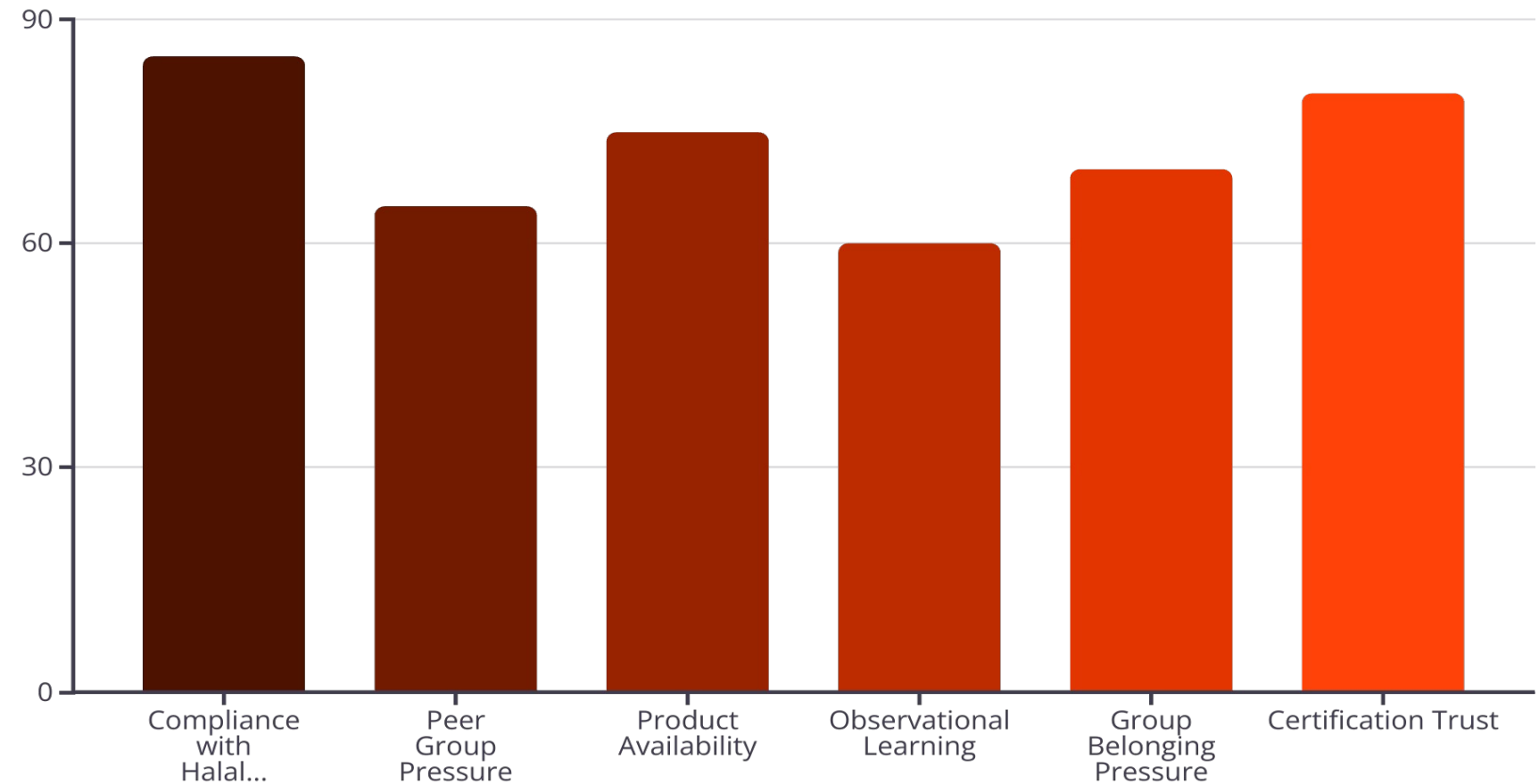

Sustainable Supply Chain Management

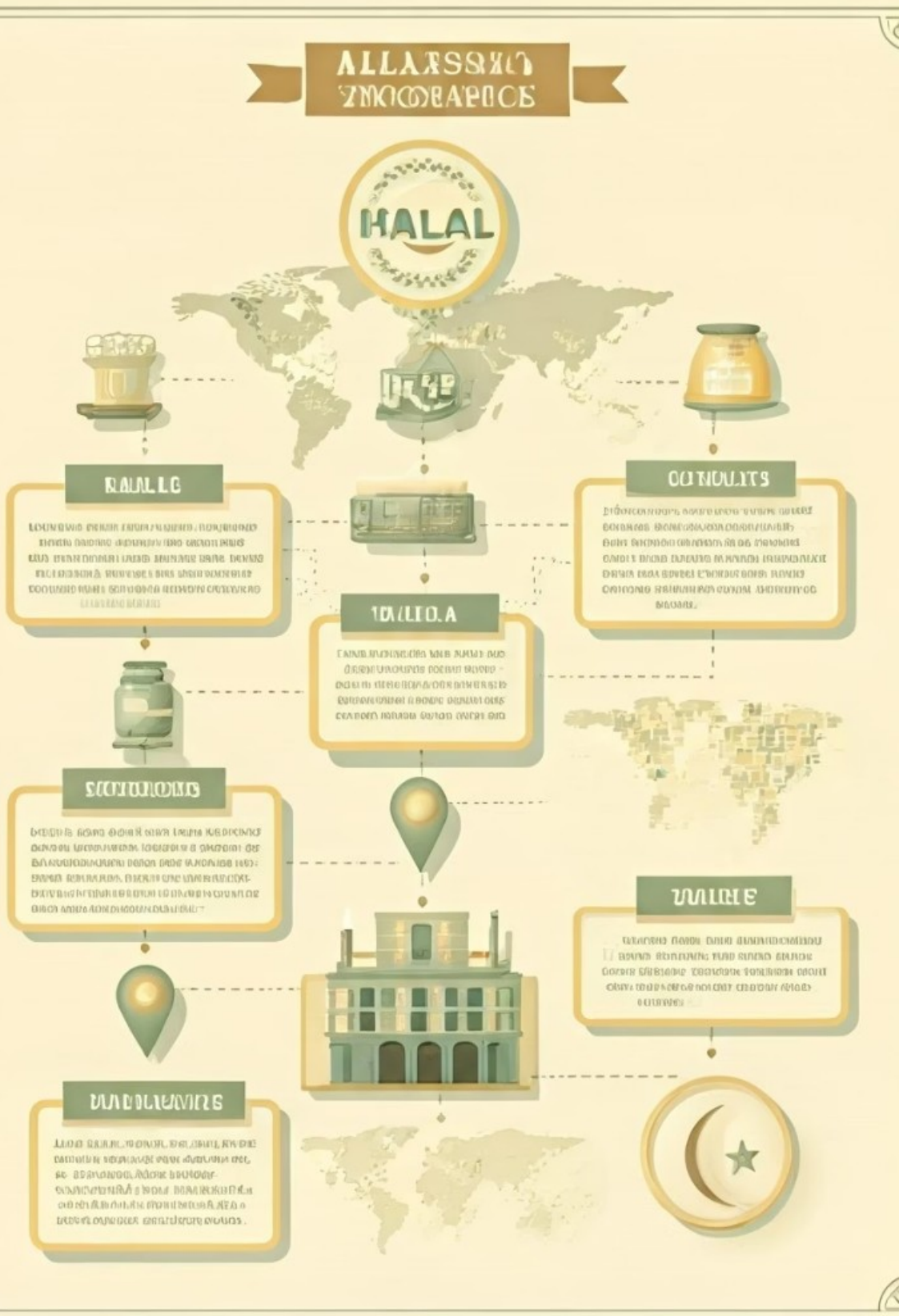

Future Trends in Halal and Sustainability

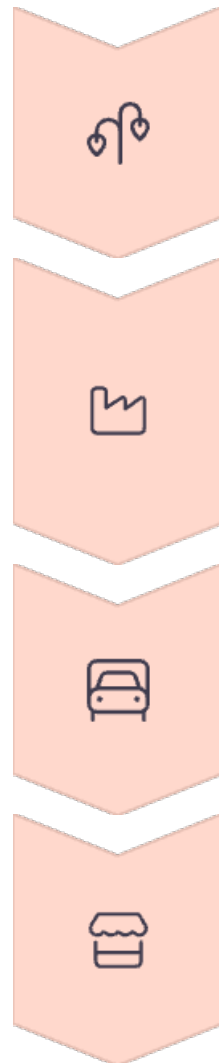

Ensuring the preservation of halal integrity up to the final product.



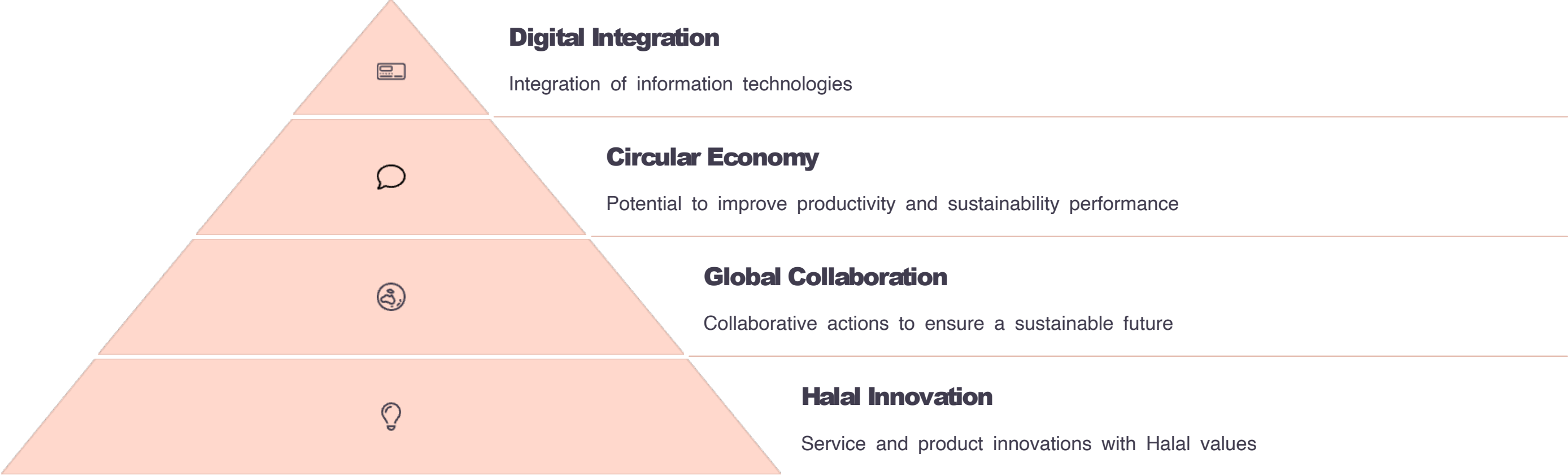
Consumer Awareness
